ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CHRISTCHURCH SEATTLE SISTER COMMITTEE JULY 2001 TO JUNE 2002

THE COMMITTEE

This year has been one of change for the Committee. Consideration is being given to meeting on a two-monthly basis to better deal with the business of the Committee and to better use the resources made available to it by the City Council.

The Committee met 9 times through this year with one Seminar meeting in August to consider the future structure, aims and objectives of the Committee and to look to 'mirroring' the structure of the Seattle Christchurch Association, with the establishment of sub-committees to look after various projects and to report to the Committee.

We were unfortunate to lose our Vice Chairman to the 'attractions' of Auckland but have retained our core of 6 members and we are actively considering new members to revitalise the Committee. We 'lost' our Councillor member to the vagaries of the Local Authority elections but have gained a new Councillor member who has been a real asset to the Committee.

All our members have strong links to the USA and the Seattle region and have spent time in our Sister City.

The year was disrupted by the tragic events of September 11, 2001.

All our members are enthusiastic supporters of the Sister City Programmes and give of their very busy lives to help the City fulfil its objectives.

The Committee is actively looking at the recruitment of new members and Associates.

2001~2002 PROGRAMME

1 EDUCATION AND SPORT

1.1 Seattle Scholar Programme

Outbound

This programme was put 'on hold' until the situation settled following 'September 11'. We were very sensitive to the enormity of the tragedy on the people of the USA and the worries and fears of families in respect of air travel. We postponed the sending of students to Seattle until March 2002. The opportunity to apply for the scholarship was sent to all Christchurch High Schools and 3 students were selected. We would normally select a 4th student from outside Christchurch but this did not eventuate this year. The students selected were very special young people and wonderful ambassadors for this City and New Zealand. The reports from the students, their host families and the Seattle Committee demonstrated the enormous value in this programme. The students reported back to the Committee following their visit to Seattle. They gained a good appreciation of life in the USA and experienced a snapshot of an American school.

Inbound

This programme was postponed until the current financial year to accommodate the wishes of the American students and will be reported on in next year's report. Needless to say they too were very special young people and their time with us a real success.

1.2 Sport

We received several requests relating to sporting links between Christchurch and Seattle.

One was for a local interest group wishing to set up an American Football league in Christchurch. The initiative came from students at Christ's College and we have created, through the Director of Sports in Seattle, a link to the Seattle Seahawks football team.

We have been looking also into the establishment of links based on rhythmic gymnastics and have been approached to look at assisting with sporting links for Basketball.

2. ARTS AND CULTURE

2.1 First Nation Links

One of the Committee's objectives is to build up a programme around First Nation links. We are delighted to report the we have now been joined by Nga Maata Waka as an associated group

2.2 Indian Carver

We are continuing with our efforts to bring an Indian carver from Seattle to create a work for the Sister City Garden Park to complement the wonderful seat carved by Doug Neil. We have identified Shaun Peterson and are working on bringing him to Christchurch early next year.

So far we have:

Obtained permission for his visit from the New Zealand Immigration Service in Washington DC

Obtained clearance as 'not liable' under the New Zealand USA 'double tax' protocols from the Inland Revenue Department

Obtained an Artist in Residence Grant from the Arts Centre

We are now working towards involvement of Maori Broadcasting and Air New Zealand in the programme.

- 2.3 Liaison was provided for the visit of the Sweet Adelines to Seattle.
- 2.4 We are exploring further links and facilities for Christchurch musicians wishing to perform in Seattle.
- 2.5 We participated in the Kids for Peace project with cranes provided by two Seattle primary schools. This initiative has real potential for the forging of closer links between Christchurch schools and Wedgewood and John Stanford Elementary Schools in Seattle.

2.6 Centre of Contemporary Art (CoCA)

We received artworks from University Prep, Seattle for display in Christchurch for the First Peoples exhibition in February. The Seattle artworks have been returned along with many artworks from Christchurch students, to be displayed at University Prep's new art gallery later this year.

2.7 Initial meetings were held with Directors of the Seattle Art Museum and the Burke Museum (University of Washington) by the Chairman and Treasurer while in Seattle. The objective was to look into exchanges between those museums and the Canterbury Museum of artefacts and displays.

3. TRADE AND COMMERCE

3.1 The Chairman and Treasurer had several meetings whilst in Seattle in November to further awareness of Christchurch and the present and potential benefits from reciprocal trade and commercial links. The meetings comprised:

Meetings with Senator Ken Jacobsen and a visit with him to Olympia (State Capital for meetings with various key officials dealing with Trade and Commerce. Discussions involved the Sister City Links and the work of the Committee in forging the development of trade.

3.2 The work of the Committee was recognised at the inauguration of the Christchurch Trade Alliance.

4. SISTER CITY 20TH ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATIONS

- 4.1 The Chairman and Treasurer travelled to Seattle in November 2001to join in the celebrations of the Sister City relationship between Seattle and Christchurch. The Chairman addressed the formal dinner with greetings from Mayor Garry Moore, the Mayor at the time of the establishment of the relationship, Sir Hamish Hay and from Malcolm Ott, the inaugural Chairman of the Christchurch Seattle Sister City Committee.
- 4.2 Meetings were held in Seattle with Martin Moore who Chairs the Seattle Christchurch Association and with his Committee members to brief them on the Christchurch Committee's programmes and to commence planning for a celebration of the 25th Anniversary to be held in Christchurch.

5. CHRISTCHURCH CITY INITIATIVES

During their visit to Seattle the Chairman and Treasurer attended additional meetings to further wider links between the two Cities:

5.1 Public Transport issues

A meeting was held with Darwin Campbell of the Metro Transport Division of the Seattle Department of Transport to brief him on Public Transport initiatives in Christchurch and in particular the 'Orbiter' Service and the 'Shuttle'. Material was brought back for the City and Ecan and considerable material sent to Seattle on public transport issues and solutions in Christchurch.

5.2 Pedestrian Safety and Cycleway Initiatives

The Chairman and Treasurer met with Peter Lagerway of the Pedestrian and Bicycle Program of the City of Seattle to brief him on the development of Cycleways in Christchurch and also on our School Speed Zones and the new technology employed. Material was brought back on the Seattle programs for officers of our City.

5.3 Police Mountain Bike Patrol

A meeting was had with Lieutenant Mike Fann, Administrative Aide to the Chief of Police, to look at the Mountain Bike Patrol and the way in which such an initiative might well be worthwhile for inner city policing in Christchurch.

5.4 First Nations

A meeting was held with David Conrad, Special Assistant for Tribal and Regional Relations. This related mainly to the Indian Carver programme but was to open the way for First nation links into the Seattle area.

6. YOUTH PROGRAMME

This programme did not proceed this year. The Committee's wish is to create a follow-on programme to involve the Seattle Scholars in the work of the Committee, in the selection of future scholars and to maintain close links with the American Scholar participants in the programme

7. COMMUNITY AWARENESS

- 7.1 Newsletter: the Committee published its first Newsletter "Pacific Bridge" for both circulation to interested people but also for publishing on the Sister City website in a downloadable (.pdf) format.
- 7.2 The Chairman's Report on the visit to Seattle in November and the accompanying photographs has been published on the web site.

7.3 Further work is progressing on the development of greater awareness of the Seattle Scholar Programme and the visiting of local High Schools to promote the Programme.

7.4 Thanksgiving Dinner

The Committee hosted a Thanksgiving Dinner attended by 22 people. It is hoped that, following the recent visit to the City if the US Vice Consul, Sita Chakrawarti, this celebration will be extended to the closer involvement of US citizens living in Christchurch and their families.

8. VISITOR PROGRAMME:

- 8.1 The Committee hosted the following visitors from Seattle during this financial year:
 - ➤ Dr John Wott, Director of the Seattle Arboretum, which included a visit to the Halswell Quarry Park;
 - ➤ Bill Stafford (ante) and his wife, with a visit to Banks Peninsular and Akaroa.

9. OTHER PROJECTS:

9.1 Sister Cities Gardens

The Committee has decided to work towards the extension of the Gardens with the addition of an area of shrubs and perennials. A list of plants and shrubs has been received from the Seattle Arboretum and it is hoped that a prominent Christchurch Garden Centre will become involved as a sponsor for the project.

9.2 Professional Exchanges

The Committee continues to support its long standing member, Lew McIvor, and the Christchurch Bone Marrow Trust with its programme to send a specialist nurse on an exchange to Seattle to spend time and to gain experience at the Fred Hutchinson Cancer Research Centre that is one of the world's foremost facilities for Cancer Research.

9.4 Rotary

With the very close ties between the Rotary Club of the University District of Washington and the Christchurch Rotary Club the Committee is assisting with the building of initiatives based on this association.

Annual Report of Christchurch-Kurashiki Sister City Committee For Period 1 July 2001 - 30 June 2002

Committee

The Committee has met 10 times during the year, with an average attendance of 9 members. The wide ranging experiences of the Committee members has enabled a good variety of ideas to be formulated on the proposed and actual programmes. We continually need to add to our number some 'fresh blood' from people who wish to help with the activities and carry the banner into the next 5-10 years. Together, the members willingly contribute what time they can in their busy lives towards the work of the committee and the visiting delegations.

2001/2002 Programme

Inbound Students

The year under review started with the July/August 2001 Student Delegation of 9 students and one leader from Kurashiki. The groups itinerary was managed under contract, by Newton Dodge and the visitors were hosted by 8 High Schools. It was a new departure to have the students spread around the city, creating a transport and logistical nightmare. Overall, a very balanced programme was planned and the budget adhered to. Thanks to the committee members that did lend a hand.

Outbound Students

In September 2001 we saw 14 students visit Kurashiki under the leadership of Colin & Justine Donald. Colin had been to Kurashiki previously and although this year he was hampered by his sudden transfer to Dunedin, he successfully carried out the groups visit. The 14 chosen students were from 9 High Schools from throughout Christchurch. From their reports, they all seemed to gain a considerable amount from the visit. Several have already played homestay host to other visitors from Kurashiki. We were fortunate that our Co-Ordinator Barbara August, was also able to visit Kurashiki as part of this group.

Kurashiki Ensemble Visit

It was great to have the Kurashiki Academy Ensemble visit Christchurch for 10 days in April 2002, to see our city and to play for outdoor activities and a formal Concert. Unfortunately the attendance at the concert was a dismal failure, but all other aspects of the visit were great. Two of the members of the group were married while in Christchurch. An enlarged version of the group, are currently planning to return to Christchurch in March 2003.

Other Projects

Sister City Gardens

Our garden is part of the Halswell Quarry Garden Park, where the six sister cities and Christchurch City have formed a cultural garden of their city or country. When matured, the Kurashiki Garden will finally consist of a wide range of Japanese trees and plants as well as a Japanese style garden and features. Committee member David Bolam-Smith has been our committee link with the committee planning the park and gardens. The Kurashiki Sister City Committee had a successful ceremony at the gardens, to place a commemorative plaque on the gazebo depicting the progress of the development and listing the committee.

Pen Pal Club

This popular project was again advertised during the year, with the result of over 100 further people being added to the Christchurch and Kurashiki files for Pen Pals. Thanks to the staff for their sterling efforts.

Support for groups and visitors

The Committee has placed a high priority on supporting individual clubs, teams, schools and organisation who feel they will benefit from an exchange with a similar group in Kurashiki. The Committee can only offer a small contribution towards such visits, but can always use its influence to open doors for the visits or hosting.

Sister School link

Mt Pleasant Primary School successfully held an exchange to their sister school Daishi Fukuda School in Kurashiki. This project has taken off with the enthusiastic help of Committee member David Bolam-Smith. A delegation from Kurashiki is due in Christchurch very shortly.

The committee is still seeking expressions of interest from other schools in Christchurch who have an interested in a similar arrangement with a school in Kurashiki.

Plans for 2003

The relationship between Christchurch and Kurashiki will reach 30 years in 2003/04. Both Cities are currently putting together their programme for celebrating the 30th anniversary of the link. These exchanges will consist of bands, ballet, students, sports, sculptors, mayoral visits and delegations. A very large Junior Philharmonic group (of 80 PAX) is planned to visit in April 2003 as part of the Anniversary programme. Other exchange ideas are currently being considered with a view to finalising the plans by the end of 2002.

'AET' Teacher appointments

The biennial appointment of 'Assistant English Teachers' (AET) is due next year again. This programme will see teachers chosen from Christchurch to spend two years in Kurashiki as Assistant English Teachers in Kurashiki High Schools.

Sister City Conference

In April 2002 the 'NZ Sister City' Conference was held in Blenheim. Three of our committee attended, along with members of the CCC International Relations staff and some City Councillors. This is always an excellent opportunity to meet many people from similar backgrounds and chat with them during formal sessions and informal activities.

City Council Support

Our Committee continues to be indebted to the Christchurch City Council and the team in the International Relations Unit for their generous annual grant to the committee and for the back-up support from our co-ordinator Barbara August. Without this help, the committee would surely and quickly falter. A special thanks to Barbara August for her growing and knowledgeable input into the relationship. We are sure Barbara's visit to Kurashiki in 2001 was worth its weight in gold, to foster this relationship.

Thanks

My special thanks to Kay Mason who has regularly and accurately kept the Committee finances up to date. To my Deputy David Bolam-Smith for his enthusiasm for every task he plans, makes life more pleasurable. To the committee members who regularly attend the meetings and functions planned, we thank you for your support. A special thanks to those who have helped at functions and activities during the year.

The International Affairs Section of the Kurashiki City Hall, have always been very helpful and co-operative in their help with exchange groups. We are thankful for the personal work done by Sam Dyer and acknowledge his retirement from this position later in the year and wish him well in his return to Australia.
